## **Suggested itinerary :**

Day 1 : Arrival and private airport transfer

Day 2 : Discovery of the town of Ubud + Visit to the monkey sanctuary and Ubud Palace + Introduction to Balinese culture + Traditional Balinese dance show

Day 3 : Batik painting course + Flower offering course

Day 4 : Community building and renovation project + Bahasa language course

Day 5 : Community building and renovation project

Day 6 : Community construction and renovation project

Day 7: Community construction and renovation project

Day 8 : Community construction and renovation project

Day 9: Cooking class + visit to the turtle conservation centre and Jimbaran beach

Day 10 : Visit to Jatiluwih, Beratan temple and Git Git waterfall

Day 11: Introduction to the turtle programme + Relaxation on the beach

Day 12: Participation in the sea turtle conservation project + rest

Day 13 : Visit to Broken tooth beach and Angel Billabong + Visit to Kelinking Point + Departure dinner and campfire on the beach.

Day 14 : Private transfer to the airport for your return flight.

#### The construction project

This humanitarian mission in Bali supports small local communities in the villages of Ubud and the surrounding area. It aims to build and renovate infrastructure that is essential to the growth and development of communities in Bali. You'll be asked to help out on a variety of sites, including schools, playgrounds and public libraries.

#### The turtle project

The sea turtle conservation programme is located on the charming island of Nusa Penida, around 45 minutes by boat from Bali. You'll be helping to protect the turtle population by working in our turtle conservation centre, which welcomes many volunteer travellers as part of our sustainable tourism programme.

The project was set up 13 years ago to take in injured turtles and recover their eggs so that they can hatch in good conditions. Some hatchlings are then released, while others are kept for a while to grow up and increase their chances of survival. Depending on the time of year (turtles don't lay eggs all year round), you can help to identify turtle species, collect eggs, monitor nests or accompany baby turtles back to the sea in safety. This programme gives you the chance to participate in sustainable development in comfortable conditions with the beach practically on your doorstep.

## **Detailed itinerary :**

Day 1 (Fri) : Arrival at the airport and transfer to accommodation.

Day 2 (Sat) : In the morning we set off to discover the town of Ubud. Located in the central part of the island, it is surrounded by rice terraces, lush tropical forests and picturesque landscapes. Ubud is often regarded as the cultural heart of Bali. In the afternoon we will visit a monkey sanctuary home to hundreds of long-tailed macaques known as the Monkey Forest. We'll also visit Ubud Palace, a historic royal complex featuring traditional Balinese architecture. In the evening, we will be treated to a traditional Balinese dance performance.

Day 3 (Sun): In the morning, we'll take part in batik painting classes. Batik is a textile dyeing and decoration technique that originated in Indonesia. It is used to create colourful patterns and designs on fabric, often cotton or silk. We will also take part in flower offering classes in the afternoon. Flower offerings play a significant role in Balinese culture and are commonly used in religious rituals, ceremonies and even everyday life. These flower offerings are called "canang sari" in Balinese. They are carefully crafted and presented to honour the gods and spirits, bring prosperity and peace, and symbolise gratitude to nature. In the evening, we'll let the group enjoy some rest.

Day 4 (Mon): During the day we will visit the construction and renovation project. This project aims to build and renovate infrastructure essential to the growth and development of communities in Bali. In the evening we'll take a Bahasa language course. Bahasa Indonesia is the official language of Indonesia and is used in government, education, media and official communication.

Day 5 (Tue) : Second day of construction and renovation project.

Day 6 (Wed) : Third day of construction and renovation project.

Day 7 (Thu) : Fourth day of the construction and renovation project.

Day 8 (Fri) : Fifth and final day of construction and renovation. In the evening we meet to discuss the first week of the project.

turtle conservation centre. In the afternoon we'll head to Jimbaran beach. Famous for it golden sands, Jimbaran beach is one of Bali's most popular beach destinations and offers a relaxing and picturesque beach experience.

Day 10 (Sun) : We visit Jatiluwih, known for its magnificent rice terraces, which have been a UNESCO World Heritage Site since 2012. The Jatiluwih rice terraces are among the most impressive in Bali and represent an outstanding example of how the Balinese have cultivated rice for centuries. We then head to the Bratan temple. Set in the mountains of central Bali, the temple is one of Bali's most iconic temples and is renowned for its picturesque beauty and serene location. Finally, we'll visit the Git Git waterfall. This offers a peaceful nature experience and a chance to relax amidst an exuberant tropical landscape.

Day 11 (Mon): To start the new week, we'll have an introduction to the sea turtle conservation programme and then begin our project. In the afternoon, we'll give the group some free time to relax on the beach.

Day 12 (Tue): Second day of the project at the turtle conservation centre in Nusa Penida and rest on the beach.

Day 13 (Wed): We will head to Broken Tooth beach renowned for its remarkable geological formation with a large natural arch cut into the limestone cliff, creating an inner pool of water. The location is impressive for its panoramic views of the sea and surrounding cliffs. We'll also visit Angel's Billabong, a famous natural rock pool formed by the erosion of limestone rock. Seawater collects in the basin at low tide, creating a natural pool of crystal-clear water. Then we'll head to the very popular Kelingking Point, the most photographed spot on Nusa Penida. Finally, to round off the holiday, we'll spend the evening around a campfire.

Day 14 (Thu): Private transfer to the airport for your return flight.
